Through home visits and personalized support our Partnership staff work to empower teen parents to create a strong foundation in which children can reach their full emotional, intellectual, social and physical potential. Family Support Workers promote health on all levels; from physical and mental, to financial and in relationships. This model works to both create a stronger bond between parent and baby, and to provide a safe, nurturing environment in which children and parents can thrive. Some of their services include assistance securing housing, employment, and continuing education, assistance finding and paying for high quality certified child care, support accessing mental health services, providing regular developmental assessments, answering parenting questions, prenatal/breastfeeding support and education, and offering parenting groups and activities.</p>	<p>Young parents ages 14-24 (average age of participant is 19) and their children are the target population for the Partnership Project.</p>	<p>\$142,851.00</p>	<p>0</p>	<p>We would like to ask the Gallatin Valley Newcomers Club to consider specifically helping to fund our Partnership Project program so that young parents like previous participant, Leslie, can receive the care, education and resources needed to be a successful parent.
