Bozeman Senior Center has been providing this service in Gallatin County for 41 years. Clients eligible for this program include all senior citizens over the age of 60, who are unable to prepare meals for themselves, or to come to the nutrition site for meals served there. Bulk frozen meals are available to homebound individuals who live outside the delivery.	Individuals in Gallatin County over the age of 60, living on limited incomes, living alone with limited family support, and coping with multiple health issues.	\$350,000.00	2,314	15%	50% of participants cannot afford a contribution towards their daily meals, and most of them receive 5-7 meals per week. The club and the foundation are two legally separate organizations. Among the Foundation's efforts are: Glen Lake Rotary Park (aka Bozeman Beach): an annual Fix Up Festival where they make about \$2,500 in improvements to as many as 12 homes owned by low income and/or disabled persons; an annual 2nd grade book giveaway where they give 2 books to every second grader in the county; weekly Meals on Wheels deliveries to as many as 12 customers; support for low income and/or at risk HS students through 700+ \$25 gift cards distributed through Bozeman, Gallatin and Belgrade High Schools; four \$2,000 scholarships to Bozeman High and Bridger Academy grads. GVF2S builds the vitality of our local food system by connecting children and families across Gallatin County to local food through education, action, and access. GVF2S crafts accessible food related programs to give people tools to make positive change for themselves, their families, and for Gallatin Valley. Their programs build agency and appreciation for our local food system.</p> <p>GVF2S accomplishes this by taking the following approaches: (1) Provide place-based, skills-based education for children and families about local food, food literacy, and nutrition; (2) Partner with institutions (such as schools) to increase access to nutritious, local food; (3) Build and foster relationships and networks within the community to cultivate community action and policies to support an accessible and resilient local food system; (4) Lead and participate in initiatives to increase local food access and equity within Gallatin County.</p>	<p>GVF2S serves youth and families in Gallatin County. They coordinate school-based and family-based programming, where teachers, caregivers and children can come together and participate in hands-on and skills-based programming surrounding food, nutrition, gardening, and more. MMP teaches the Mindfulness in Schools (MIS) curriculum. MMP partners with schools and youth-serving organizations to provide MIS as a behavioral health and mental wellbeing intervention and prevention strategy, in part to offset post-COVID developmental delays, for all youth, and especially vulnerable youth. The MIS curriculum consists of 20 lessons (one 20-30 minute session per week) which unfold in a progression that supports students in cultivating greater self awareness and the foundational skills of mindfulness.</p>	<p>MMP offers mindfulness training to youth ages 3-26, from early childhood to young adulthood, and those supporting our youth (parents, caregivers, teachers) through a variety of audience-specific programming.</p>	<p>\$158,164.00</p>	<p>1,500</p>	<p>6%</p>	<p>MMP would appreciate the opportunity to receive general operating funds to bolster their organizational budget as they seek to hire a paid Development Director. In 2021, One Montana launched Outside Kind to help protect our outdoor resources and enhance public enjoyment by sharing best practices, principles, and tips for being in the outdoors together. The Outside Kind Campaign supports the tenets of building an inclusive outdoors, sharing leave no trace principles, and being safe and responsible on our public trails. Our goal is to help everyone be a better and more conscientious user of our shared public resources and encourage others to do the same. Increased use and crowding is causing tension across our shared outdoor spaces in Bozeman, throughout Montana and around the West. We are seeing more and more conflicts between users, damage to important natural resources, and additional financial burdens for maintaining our natural resources. There is more competition for parking spaces at trail heads, campsites, and fishing access sites. The Gallatin Valley Land Trust has incorporated Outside Kind into their strategic plan and the City of Bozeman has included Outside Kind in their current planning documents. They have also been approached by several organizations, such as Bridger Bowl Ski Area and Crosscut Mountain Sports Center among others to do trainings for their staff. <b>Reese Creek Community Center- Restoration of Historic Schoolhouse</b> <a href="http://www.reesecreekcommunitycenter.org">www.reesecreekcommunitycenter.org</a>	<p>This non-profit was created to preserve and maintain the original Reese Creek Schoolhouse, one of the original 77 one-room Schoolhouses in the Gallatin Valley. In the last few years, the school has been showing its age and in December of 2019, the Restoration Committee of the Reese Creek Community Center was created to assess the needs of the 1904 original schoolhouse. The goal of RCCC is to protect the schoolhouse structure from further degradation and begin restoring it and furnishing it with the original artifacts. Upon completion of the restoration of the site, the one room schoolhouse will transport visitors back 100 years in history. <b>Thrive's Parent Liaison Program</b> <a href="http://www.allthrive.org">www.allthrive.org</a>	<p>Thrive's Parent Liaison program, Thrive's most requested program, encourages a strong link between home and school. Parent Liaisons facilitate parenting classes, connect parents to community resources, provide 1:1 coaching for parents, and support parent-teacher collaboration. This program is grounded in the fact that family engagement in school is critical to the success of children. Parent Liaisons provide over 7,000 individual services to 640+ families annually in the Bozeman School District as well as instruct MSU student teachers in Thrive's Engaging Parents as Partners workshop. During the 2021-2022 school year the program also made 944 "welcome calls" to all new district families and kindergarten parents, had 620+ parents attend their classes, and supported 2,230 individuals. The program now has a dedicated Parent Liaison to serve the Spanish speaking community. All services offered in the Parent Liaison program are provided free of charge.
